


Big Sir's Corner

Hiking

Our inaugural monthly walk was held on Friday, February 14 with **Mark Curtis, Earl Bates and Bob Wilkenfeld** in attendance. Since there was a small group and all were experienced hikers, we walked a loop on the Contra Costa Canal Trail, and residential streets, from Valley Vista Road to Heather Farms Park and back. Total mileage was 7-miles with negligible elevation. A hydration stop midway at Peet's Coffee replenished our energy.

Las Trampas Wilderness was the location for our hike on February 17. **Earl Bates, Cleo Bolen, Ray Martz and Bob Wilkenfeld** completed this 4.8-mile hike, with a climb of 1300 feet, in record time and with only "a little" mud on our boots. The weather was overcast, which helped prevent us from overheating, but the unobstructed view from the Las Trampas ridge was amazing — one could see from San Francisco to Mt Diablo and the surrounding area.



Despite gloomy weather and some badly rutted trails, **Cleo Bolen, Eric Finson, Chris Duffek (guest), Bob Lively (and Winny his poodle), Ray Martz, Gene Schulting and Bob Wilkenfeld** had a great outing in the Diablo Foothills on February 24th. Our 4.5-mile hike took us over rolling hills for a total climb of 760 feet. We managed to catch our resident photographer, **Cleo** focusing his camera on us!

Castle Rock Regional Park was the venue of our hike on March 3rd. We ended up hiking 6.7 miles and 1,100 ft elevation gain, due to a miss-calculation by the planner — Yikes! The most memorable moments were watching everyone negotiate the 15-stream crossings along the way — Double Yikes!!!

The Seaview and Vollmer Peak Trails in Tilden Park provided great views on our March 10 outing. **Eric Finson, Chris Duffek, Bob Lively, Ray Martz, Roger May-**

er, and Gene Schulting completed the 5.5-mile hike with a climb of almost 1200 feet. (So much for trusting *All Trails* statistics for planning a hike.)

Though we love the rain, as it means the end of a drought, it also makes for lousy hiking conditions. Thus, our easy, flat walk for the month of March was scuttled. Look for its return in April.

The hikes we plan are 4-7 miles in length with up to 1000 feet of climbing. AREA 16 Fishing Report

February and March are usually not good months for fishing in the Bay Area because of the wind and the rain and 2025 has not been an exception.

Our best results, surprisingly, have been with starry flounder in the Delta. The best time to catch this tasty fish is the winter, and 2025 has proven to be an especially good year for them. **Ron Lew** and **Ken Bellendir** made three trips this month and caught lots of flounder, reaching 30 on the best day. **Tom Kostik** caught and released his normal quota of stripers (47, including four keepers) but he also picked up nine flounder. **Mike Corker** fished only for a couple of hours, but he did catch one stripers and one flounder.

Trout fishing was a little better this month. **Stan Wong** made his first trip ever to Los Vaqueros Reservoir, where he caught five trout. He also hauled in a 15 inch black bass and a 20 inch stripers. **Bob Lively** caught lots of big trout (up to five and six pounds) while fishing from his kayak in Contra Loma Reservoir. Unfortunately, however, **Eric Finson** and **Carl Moyer** failed to get a single bite while fishing in Shadow Cliffs Reservoir. And winds of 80 mph stopped **Pedro Contreras** from fishing for cutthroat trout at Pyramid Lake in Nevada.

We are anxiously awaiting the return of halibut to San

Francisco Bay at the end of March, and we are hopeful the bite remains as good as it has been for the last two years. We are also planning for a big trout outing at Lake Almanor in May. In addition, the rockfish season opens on April 1. However, we remain worried about salmon season. We have been unable to fish for salmon in California waters for the past two years and reports of salmon in the ocean or returning to spawn in the rivers have been dismal. There may be a season, but it could be limited to a few weeks.

On the social front, 20 of us celebrated **Gordon Linebaugh's** 90th birthday at the home of **Brion Beetz** on February 26. **Gordon's** birthday is February 15 but, for some strange reason, he preferred to be on a Mexican cruise with his wife on the big day. **Gordon** remains active in the fishing department and is planning to go to British Columbia this summer with three other members of our group to catch some big salmon. But he is being careful. Two of his three companions will be doctors.

Our next breakfast meeting will be on April 24 at the Legends Bar and Grill, at Diablo Creek Golf Course at 4050 Port Chicago Highway, in Concord. You are welcome to join us, even if you have never fished or have not fished in a long time. The meetings begin at 8:30 am but come earlier for breakfast (beginning at 7 am) for camaraderie and fish stories.



We welcome newcomers and their wives or significant others as well. Send me an email and I will add you to the list of members.



Book Group Nick Jabuka

The SIR 146 Book group held its February meeting at Panera Bread to discuss this month's book 'Over the Edge of the World' by Laurence Bergreen, and to catch up on SIR



news and what group members were up to. Our book was an exciting tale of adventure, intrigue, interaction with various native cultures, and detail of the motivations and depravations of the first crew to circumnavigate the globe some five-hundred years ago.

The book chronicles the earlier life and accomplishments of Ferdinand Magellan, a loyal Portuguese soldier, and his attempts to obtain backing from the Portuguese king to lead an expedition to navigate to the Spice Islands (Moluccas) by going West to the Americas and finding an opening (straits) to the Pacific. The Spice Islands were a source of spices, including cloves, nutmeg, and mace. New to Europe, these spices were fabulously expensive, more valuable than gold.

Control of the Islands was a prize both the Spanish and Portuguese sought. Magellan attempted to convince the Portuguese king, Manuel, but to no avail, and he turned instead to the Spanish crown for backing. The

book compiled many diaries and other historical documents from the period. It weaves a fascinating tale of Magellan's Armada and its route to the spice islands, interactions with indigenous tribes in South American and the Pacific Islands, and the political machinations going on between the competing Portuguese and Spanish powers.

Magellan was a man of many contradictions. Courageous, ambitious, tenacious, cunning, and heroic, yet at times foolish and unyielding. Due to bad luck and overly harsh interactions with the crew, he was confronted by several mutinies, both tremendous and small. He managed to survive them all, only to die in the Philippines after getting needlessly involved in local tribal fighting. The author also paints a harsh picture of the starvation, disease, and torture suffered by the crew due to poor nutrition, living conditions, and battles for leadership of the enterprise, which dogged it from the beginning of the trip. The expedition of 5 ships with approximately 270 crew members left Seville in September 1519. Some three years later, only one ship returned with 18 starving and emaciated men.

While Magellan did not survive the trip, in addition to circumnavigating the globe, the expedition was partially responsible for dispelling many reigning myths about "mermaids, boiling water at the equator, sea serpents and powerful magnetic islands." It also provided the first clear understanding of the Pacific Ocean's width and immensity and the position and complexities of the southern route around the Americas.

Recommendation


Our group highly recommends this book. It should be a good read and educational to anyone interested in the ocean, exploration, history, or anthropology.

Next month's book is *The Mighty Red* by Louise Erdrich. It is a story of the rural Red River Valley of North Dakota. This book intertwines themes of community struggles, love, environmental issues, and personal redemption.



As we indicated in the last issue of the SIRCall, we were actively looking for a restaurant for our March Dining Out event. I can tell you now that we decided to return to one of our top choices of culinary destinations – Luna’s Restaurant in Concord, where we dined in January of 2024. We’ve gotten to know the chef/owner Habib Jacifi over the last few months since he also reigns over another favorite destination – Fiore’s, also in Concord. These restaurants are well known by many of our membership and your hosts have eaten at both restaurants several times. The reviews in Trip Advisor and Yelp describe this restaurant as elegant, romantic and upscale. It is located a stone’s throw from Todos Santos Plaza in Concord, just off Willow Pass Road on a side street.

It is always easy to negotiate a menu and price with Habib and this time was no exception. We were able to add a tasty appetizer – the Olive Pesto dip, as well as a selection of main dishes as entrees. One of Habib’s specialties is soups – and so we have this as one of our menu items, with the Caesar salad as another option. The four entrees include Chicken Marsala, Gamberi, Lasagna, and their signature Short Ribs. We publicized the March restaurant selection at the end of February and true to form, we were sold out in a bit over 24 hours. We had decided to give our new SIR members a bit of a head start by sending out our announcement to members who joined in the last year a few days before the general notice – and two decided to join us!

The total cost of this month’s restaurant choice is \$56, including tax and tip. Because this restaurant is a relatively small neighborhood establishment, we initially limited the number to 46. 

Max Hinkle earned 1st Place with 43.5 points. Congratulations, **Max**.


