




Big Sir's Corner


The next Bocce Ball activity will be on May 11, 2026.





First, I would like to extend a thank you to **Cleo Bolen**. I was out of town on the date of the October fishing meeting and so **Cleo** took

notes for me. The report below is largely based on his notes.

Most of the productive fishing in October was in the Delta. **Tom Kostik**, our persistent Delta fisherman, continued his forays into that body of water. He made three trips out of Orwood, but his most productive trip was near Ryer Island. He landed and released 19 black bass, a couple of bluegill and 19 stripers between 13 and 24 inches. Apparently, 19 is his lucky number!

Ken Bellendir, Harry Sherinian, and Mike Pruett also fished the Delta. **Ken** caught quite a few black bass on a day where the water was unusually clear and calm. **Harry** caught and released nine black bass and a couple of stripers while **Mike** limited his intake to perch.

The only member of our group to venture into the ocean was **Carl Moyer**. He made two trips on his skiff out of Pacifica, catching rockfish and lingcod on each occasion. He also sailed on the *Sea Wolf* to the Faralones, where the rockfish and lingcod are much larger. The trip took three hours each way, but **Carl** was rewarded with limits of both species. **Carl** also hosted his semi-annual fish fry at his home on November 3, where the group enjoyed rockfish and lingcod that he and others caught earlier in the year, plus green salad, potato salad, and delicious brownies baked by **Carl's** wife, **Marcia**.

Our next breakfast meeting is scheduled for December 18 at the Legends Bar and Grill at Diablo Creek Golf Course, 4050 Port Chicago Highway in Concord. Our usual gathering is on the fourth Thursday of the month, but in December, we meet on the third Thursday because of the holiday. Field Trip Report.

At 8:30 AM, a group of twelve SIR birders met at Wetlands Edge Park between Vallejo and Napa.

This area has a nice mix of aquatic habitats including freshwater ponds, streams, sloughs, rivers, and saltwater bays. We ended up spotting a whopping 53 species of birds. Some highlights of the trip included two Merlins, a White-tailed Kite, 26 Black-crowned Night Herons, 11 species of shorebirds including Black-necked Stilts, American Avocets, Marbled Godwits, and Willets.

On our next field trip will be on December 12th, and we will concentrate on learning how to identify shorebirds and a variety of marine ducks. We will have a late start, 10:00 am and finish by 12:30 pm., to coincide with a low tide and to avoid rush hour traffic. This trip has been changed to the 2nd Friday of the month to avoid a medical scheduling conflict. The location will be announced the weekend before. The highlight of the hike was walking through a dense grove of Oak trees and enjoying lunch at the Amphitheater – an ancient Native American site where they ground acorns into flour.

The hikes we plan are 4-7 miles in length with up to 1000 feet of climbing. We also host a 3-4 mile flat walk each month on the 2nd Friday of each month (i.e., the morning following our Branch Luncheon). 

The short stories were all interesting and fun reads. Our group had a little more mixed views on the novella, some thinking it dragged on or that the plot was contrived. Even so, the group found the writing wonderful and the stories fun and interesting. If you have read Amor Towles before and liked his work, then we can recommend Table for Two.

Next Month's Book




YTD: **Bill Vizza** has the most wins with 24 followed by **Steve Ybarra** with 21.5, and **Brian McCarthy** with 21.






