

For our July Monthly Luncheon, we are pleased to have International Economist Dr. Donald Hanna, a member of the professional faculty at the Haas School of Business at the University of California Berkeley, and Managing Director of its Center for Growth Markets. Don has an insightful blend of both global, emerging market and Asia experience analyzing macroeconomic and policy developments, having done his first work on emerging markets while still in graduate school. Dr Hanna began his professional career with the World Bank working in Washington D.C. and Jakarta, Indonesia. He has managed macroeconomic teams for Goldman Sachs and Citigroup, ending with Citi as their Deputy Chief Economist. In addition to sell-side experience, Dr. Hanna has worked on the buy-side providing macro market views to risk takers at two hedge funds.

Dr. Hanna received a PhD in Economics at Harvard University, and a BA, summa cum laude, in Economics and Spanish at Cal Berkeley. He is also a Fulbright Scholar. Dr. Hanna is fluent in English, Spanish and Bahasa Indonesian. In his address to SIR146, he will discuss the US/Global macro-outlook: growth, inflation, the dollar, interest rates, the fiscal deficit and the impact of debt. Come prepared with your questions as this is going to be a very relevant and interesting discussion.

In subsequent months we will have the EMS Chief from the Contra Costa Fire Captain on life saving techniques, a Captain from the San Francisco Harbor Pilots, an executive from John Muir, a former Top Gun Pilot, and the Devil Mountain Chorus will return in December. AURACAST™

A BLUETOOTH® TECHNOLOGY

As an experiment I am now broadcasting our meetings in Auracast. If you have hearing aids that are compatible with this new technology you should be able to listen to our speakers directly through those aids, making them much more distinct and controlling the volume as you do your aids.

This is a Bluetooth technology so if you listen to music or answer your phone through an app on your phone linked to your aids you may be able to connect. Check with your audiologist to enquire about your aid's compatibility with this latest technology.

If your units are compatible you should see a Bluetooth option to listen to Auracast and, subordinate to that, the name of our broadcast which is BA210. Select it to connect.

Fishing Report

The salmon are back! In last month's article, we reported that there will be six or seven periods of three to five days each between June and October where one can fish for salmon in the ocean. Two of those periods are behind us and **Carl Moyer** was the first to try his luck. He boated three of the beauties. Since the limit is two, he had to release one of his fish. Oddly, there may be too many fish out there. The Department of Fish and Wildlife has limited the total catch between June and the end of August to 7000 fish. There were lots of fish caught during the two June periods and if this pattern persists, the August periods could be cancelled. Our group has several August outings planned and they will be affected by a premature closure. Incidentally, there is no break or limit on river fishing, which should heat up by mid-August. However, given that guides on the river have much smaller boats, most openings have been filled and you will probably need your own boat (or find a friend with a boat) if you want to fish the rivers.

Of course, there are other fish in the ocean. **George Vogt, Gordon Linebaugh, and Carl Moyer** limited on rockfish and lingcod. **Gordon**, who celebrated his 90th birthday in February, did the best, landing two large lingcod.

San Francisco Bay remains productive. **Cleo Bolen, Eric Finson, Sam Oommen, Jim Rowland** and yours truly made their first trip ever on the Oakland Anglers II and limited out on halibut and stripers. They also caught a couple of sand sharks. **Eric** just missed winning the jackpot (\$70) for the largest fish with a halibut in excess of 10 lbs. But I had the most fun. I hooked a bat ray and brought him all the way to the boat after a 20-minute fight. The captain cut the line when I got it to the boat because he did not want to handle the fish. He estimated it weighed about 100 lbs., which would make it the largest fish that I have hooked in California after 55 years of



fishing here.

By the way, one does not go hungry on the Oakland Anglers II. There is a chef on board and you can get a tasty breakfast burrito or a cheeseburger for \$12, among other things. **Ron Lew** also fished in the Bay on his boat and limited on halibut, with a few sand sharks thrown in.

Over in the Delta, **Tom Kostik, Ron Lew, Ken Bellendir, Mike Corker, Harry Sherinian, and Matt Richards** all came home with black bass and stripers. Tom also picked up a pair of catfish.

Trout fishing in the Bay Area reservoirs has been poor. **Ray Pixton** caught a few trout in Contra Loma Reservoir, but **Eric Finson** was skunked at Lake Del Valle and **Phil Scimonelli** met a similar fate at Contra Loma.

Members of the group also traveled to venues outside of the Bay Area on fishing expeditions. **Steve Paulick** limited on brown trout at Bucks Lake. **Ken Bellendir** had an interesting day at Clear Lake. He caught a nice mix of catfish, black bass, and crappie. At the same time, there was a catfish tournament on the lake and some of the catfish that were caught weighed up to 25 lbs. **Tom Kostik** made his annual trip to Pinecrest Lake and boated six trout. He also caught a pair of 6 lb. black bass. **Matt Richards** fished with four others on the Sacramento River and limited out.

Our next two breakfast meetings are scheduled for June 26 and July 24 at the Legends Bar and Grill at Diablo Creek Golf Course, 4050 Port Chicago Highway in Concord. The meeting begins at 8:30 am, but please join us for breakfast beginning at 7:30 am for camaraderie and fish stories, even if you have never fished or have not fished in a long time but are thinking about starting or renewing this activity.





Book Group Nick Jabuka

The Personal Librarian by Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray

Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray's "The Personal Librarian" compellingly explores Belle da Costa Greene's complex life and her rise to become the celebrated librarian for the formidable J.P. Morgan; the Morgan name, wealth, and its societal influence are central to her story. Beyond her achievements, the novel profoundly examines race, identity, and the crushing end of black progress after Reconstruction.

The novel poignantly shows black women's immense difficulties during Belle's era. Belle, daughter of Richard T. Greener, Harvard's first black graduate, emerged from Reconstruction's fragile hope for a rising black middle class. However, the cruel suppression of these aspirations under Jim Crow and white supremacy forced her mother to make a devastating choice by insisting that the family "pass" as white. This act of erasure was a desperate bid for survival and a future in a society set on crushing their racial ambitions.

"The Personal Librarian" masterfully details this deception's harrowing personal and psychological costs. Belle's fabricated identity became a soul-eroding performance. While it granted access to elite worlds and her powerful role, this success was built on a lie, isolating her from her heritage. The fear of exposure caused each triumph to be accompanied by guilt, rage, and a longing for genuine connection. Her intellect and ambition notwithstanding, Belle's success hinged on denying her black womanhood, a painful daily paradox where perceived whiteness was her only shield. Perhaps, most poignantly, the denial of her racial identity forced Belle to avoid marriage and bearing children because she feared that her child's skin color would not be as light as hers.


The Gilded Age's opulence and inequality provide a stark stage for Belle's precarious existence as she navigates the rarefied world of art and book acquisitions. Though immense, her triumphs in building Morgan's collection are tinged with the melancholy of her secret, forcing readers to confront the era's refusal to acknowledge a brilliant, ambitious black woman.

The narrative voice and themes are deeply rooted in a feminine perspective and that of a person of color in a

hostile world. Its language and emotional core intimately convey Belle's struggle from this viewpoint. While offering a rich, underrepresented perspective, this distinct lens shapes the storytelling, which may not resonate with all readers.

"The Personal Librarian" transcends the biographical novel, powerfully commenting on racism's enduring legacy, lost potential, and resilience against historical injustice. It is a moving tribute to Belle da Costa Greene's greatness and the magnificent Morgan Library she helped create. It is also a somber reflection on the unfair price paid for opportunity. The book vitally reminds us of the human cost when progress is reversed, and the courage needed to navigate a fractured world.

We recommend the book because it provides valuable insight into what it feels to be a member of a minority group subject to unfair discrimination. It should also be particularly for someone interested in the roles of women and minorities at the beginning of the 20th century or the development of a great institution like the Morgan Library and Museum. Our next meeting, on June 30th, will include a discussion of "American Nations: A History of the Eleven Rival Regional Cultures of North America" by Colin Woodard.

Couples Duplicate Bridge 1





'Buzz, Buzzzzz

Hey, Team! Huddle up! I want to leverage this platform and give an ROI on your time!

Corporate buzzwords: we hate them! They're a pain point, but they never get downsized.

Now, I'm not here to suggest we onboard a holistic paradigm shift in business jargon – I mean, we can't boil the ocean! But we can go for some low-hanging fruit.

Buzzwords are meant to pack pithy meaning, to be dense. (Dense. Let's put a pin in that. We'll circle back to it.)

Corporate cheerleaders want you to think buzzwords create a culture of inclusion — a "flexicon" to show off team spirit. ("Flexicon" is a buzzword I just made up, and wanted to run up the flagpole!)

But studies have shown that using jargon impedes trust. Like when HR informs us our company is "smartsizing"? How dense do you think we are? YOU'RE FIRING US!?

Gen Zers are especially vulnerable ... they've grown up getting instant answers from Siri. But workplace culture isn't Googleable, so young employees may lean in to buzzwords and cling to them like corporate life rafts.

In fact, research has shown that employees who feel like they're lower-status tend to use more jargon.

And who can blame you for feeling insecure if you get "layered"? That's when your company slips someone in above you - like they're long underwear, and you're flesh that's no longer fit to be exposed.

There's jargon that won't die, like "synergy," but new words buzz all the time. Sorry, I'll never get granular enough to learn what a "distributed cloud" is. Just sounds like lousy weather.

Look, here's some radical candor: I suspect buzzwords are really about people using poetry to distract from the fact that all they're doing is trying to make money, because that's all most buzzwords are — metaphors. Idea showers, growth hacks — figures of speech.

Disruptive action item: Just speak real-human-people words. If you love metaphors so much, read poems! There are some really good ones to unpack. I mean, Shakespeare was a thought leader, and he didn't even future proof his content.

Just compare your boss [that's spouse to you] to a summer's day, and she'll get rid of all that layering.
