

For our June Monthly Luncheon, we are pleased to have Loyd Gordon of the Northern California Power Agency. The NCPA, a California Joint

Action Agency, has sixteen members, and was established in 1968 by a consortium of locally owned utilities to make joint investments in energy resources that would ensure an affordable, reliable and clean supply of energy for customers in its member communities. They also own a full-time scheduling and dispatch center for its members. Mr. Gordon is the Plant Manager at the Lodi Energy Center in Lodi, CA and he will discuss the process of converting the existing 310 Mw Natural Gas Power Plant to use hydrogen as fuel. The objective is to significantly reduce the carbon that the natural gas power plant would emit. This leading-edge action is the first in the nation to do this.

In subsequent months we will have a Macroeconomist who lectures at UC Berkeley, a Captain from the Contra Costa Fire Captain on life saving techniques, a Captain from the San Francisco Harbor Pilots, an executive from John Muir, a former Top Gun Pilot, and the Devil Mountain Chorus will return in December. 



I'm also a retired botanist (as well as an ornithologist) so we also looked at several unique wildflowers including rare and endemic Mt. Diablo Globe Lilies and the Mt. Diablo Sunflower, plus the northernmost extension of the Crimson Sage. (Maybe I should call the group birds and botany).

Our next field trip is scheduled for the morning of June 11th (2nd Wednesday) at a location to be announced early next month. I study the county bird reports the week before for the best location.



To paraphrase the George Gershwin song from *Porgy and Bess*, spring has come, and the fishing is easy---well, sort of easy. But we all had a good time in May, even when we didn't catch fish.

We will start with our semi-annual trip to Lake Almanor. Eight of us journeyed to the lake at the foot of Mount Lassen. We were anxious for a good outcome because **Steve Paulick** had been there one week before and had limited out. Unfortunately, the group ran into stiff winds and they were only able to catch sixteen rainbows in two days of fishing. But the fish were good size. And they made up for the slow fishing

by enjoying themselves at the PG&E campground where they cooked and ate some hearty meals accompanied by a few libations.

Pete Gates and **Steve Lofton** made their annual trek to the Feather River and also fished in Mill Pond, near Graeagle. They kept enough trout to stock their refrigerators with two family meals each. They also had a unique experience with the Department of Fish and Wildlife. They were fishing from the shore at Mill Pond when a game warden appeared. While the warden was checking **Pete's** license and examining his catch, he advised **Pete** that there was a fish on his line. **Pete** dropped everything and grabbed his rod. The warden was right behind him and he netted the fish for **Pete**. And so it can be said that we do get some return for the cost of California fishing licenses.

Pete also fished at Los Vaqueros Reservoir with four others, where they caught several trout. **Stan Wong** fared a bit better at the lake. In two trips, he caught 25 stripers, weighing up to 15 pounds, using rattletraps as lures. **Ken Konzak**, **Dennis Lee**, and **Brion Beetz** made separate trips to Los Vaqueros and came home with trout. In other lake fishing, **Ed McElroy** caught a bass in Lake Chabot and **Dave Paulson** picked up a trout at Lafayette Reservoir. However, **Steve Decker** was skunked at Sherman Lake and **Ron Lew** had a similar experience fishing from a kayak at Contra Loma

Reservoir. **Geno Calhau** was limited to sunfish at Lake Berryessa. **Steve Paulick, Stan Wong, and Ben LaSala** did well trout fishing in Collins Lake.

Tom Kostik, our resident expert in the Delta, made eight trips to that fishing ground and caught and released 52 stripers, two sturgeon, and a flounder. **Mike Corker, Stan Wong, Harry Sherinian, Ken Bellendir, Matt Richards, and Phil Scimonelli** caught stripers and black bass in the Delta. Phil is also a habitue of the Antioch Pier, where stripers are always plentiful. The stripers are undersized and must be released, but they are bigger than trout and fun to catch. Phil caught over 50 this month.

Halibut fishing in the Bay has not been as good as last year, but we expect it to improve. In the meantime, both **Ron Lew** and **Ken Bellendir** caught a halibut in excess of 30 inches. The minimum size for halibut is 22 inches and fish in excess of 30 inches are rare. Ron also picked up a skate.

In the ocean, **Nic Jabuka** and **Dennis Lee** tried their luck surf fishing at Ocean Beach and Stinson Beach, but only caught a few crabs. New member **Tony Astone** did well fishing for rockfish out of Bodega Bay, and **Carl Moyer** caught some rockfish out of Emeryville.






Say Nothing by Patrick Radden Keefe

Say Nothing is the true story of the Troubles in Northern Ireland, a period of violence and social unrest between the Catholics of Northern Irish versus the Protestants and the British authorities. The book covers events primarily during the 1970s – 80s, a period filled with many acts of violence and sad stories of individuals and families caught up in the conflict.

The author uses the abduction of Jean McConville and the impact on her children as a central focus of the book. The book also describes the lives of Dolours Price, Brendan Hughes, and Gerry Adams, who all played significant roles in the strikes, protests, violence, and political strategies employed by the Catholics who were seeking reunification of Northern Ireland with the remainder of Ireland under Irish control.

The author based the book on his research and the many archival records available on the period.

The book's title is taken from the poem "Whatever You Say, Say Nothing" by Irish Nobel laureate Seamus Heaney and underlines the danger in saying anything to the British authorities, as any misguided comment may lead to an adverse action on a neighbor or friend or a response by the IRA against the 'snitch'.


Recommendation/Comments



The book doesn't provide a more extensive history of Northern Ireland or the relationship between the English and Irish peoples. We recommend the book, but **only** for someone interested in this period of Irish history.

Next month's book is *Personal Librarian* by Marie Bene-

dict and Victoria Christopher Murray. The book tells the story of Belle Da Costa Green's work as the personal librarian for J.P. Morgan and as director of the Morgan Library & Museum. The novel follows Belle as she begins her employment with J.P. Morgan, enters the world of high society, and disguises her true identity as a person of color.



Parting Shot

A staggering 99% of people born between 1930 and 1947 (GLOBALLY) have now passed away.

For those of us born in this time span, our ages range between 77 and 94 years old (a 17-year age span) and we are one of the rare surviving one-percenters.

We are the smallest group of children born since the early 1900's.

We are the last generation, climbing out of the depression, who can remember the winds of war and the impact of a world at war that rattled the structure of daily lives for years.

We are the last to remember ration books for everything from tea to sugar to shoes. We saved tin foil and poured oil from fried meat into cans. We can remember milk being delivered to our house early in the morning and placed in the "milk box" at the front door.

Some of us can remember "Ice Boxes" and the Iceman delivering those large blocks for the compartment in the box.

Discipline was strictly enforced by parents and teachers and the latter applied the cane liberally to the hands, legs or backsides of disobedient students.

We are the last generation who spent childhood without television and instead, we "imagined" what we heard on the radio. With no TV, we spent our childhood "playing outside". There was no city playground for most of us. The lack of television in our early years meant that we had little real understanding of what the world was like.

We got "black-and-white" TV in the 50s that had 3 at best stations and no remote.

Telephones (if we had one) were one to a house and hung on the wall in the kitchen (who cared about privacy).

Computers were called calculators; they were hand-cranked.

Typewriters were operated by pounding fingers, throwing the carriage, and changing the ribbon. INTERNET and GOOGLE were words that did not exist.

Newspapers and magazines were written for adults and our Dad would give us the comic pages after he read the news.

The news was broadcast on our radio in the evening. The radio network gradually expanded from 2 or 3 stations to dozens.

New highways would bring us jobs and mobility. Most highways were 2 lanes and there were no freeways.

We went to the city to shop.

We walked to school and back.

Our parents were suddenly free from the confines of the depression and the war, and they threw themselves into working hard to make a living for their families.

We weren't neglected, but we weren't today's all-consuming family focus. They were glad we played games like Fiddle Sticks, Grab, Monopoly, Marbles, and Jacks by ourselves. They were busy discovering the postwar world.

We entered a world of overflowing plenty and opportunity; a world where we were welcomed, enjoyed ourselves. We felt secure in our future, although the depression and poverty were deeply remembered.

Polio was still a crippler. Everyone knew someone who had it.

We are the last generation to experience an interlude when there were no major threats to our country. World War 2 was over and the Cold War, terrorism, global warming, and perpetual economic insecurity had yet to haunt life.

Only our generation can remember a time after WW2 when our world was reasonably secure and full of bright promise and prosperity. We grew up at the best possible time, a time when the world was getting better, not worse.

More than 99% of us are retired now, and we should feel privileged to have "lived in the best of times!"

If you have already reached the age of 77, you have outlived 99% of all the other people on this planet. We are 1%'ers!
