

Originally known as "Decoration Day," the holiday started with communities coming together to decorate the graves of those who died during service. The federal government declared Waterloo, New York, the official birthplace of Memorial Day when the city closed all businesses so residents could decorate the gravesites of soldiers with flowers and American flags every year and established it as a federal holiday in 1971.



At 8:00am, a group of five SIR birders hiked Mitchell Canyon and halfway up Red Rock Road on the north side of Mt. Diablo to catch spring migrants at a funnel point. We ended up spotting or hearing 40 species of birds. The highlights of the trip included seeing three species of vireos (Hutton's, Cassin's, and Warbling) and great close-up views of two Blue-gray Gnatcatchers.

Our next field trip is scheduled for 8:30am on May 5th (Monday) at Castle Rock Regional Recreation Area located at the end of Castle Rock Road in Walnut Creek. The Peregrine Falcons have returned to nest this year, and I will bring a spotting scope for great close-up views. If interested, please email Ted Robertson so you can be added to the monthly mailing list.

Beginners through experts are welcome, plus I have a few loaner binoculars if requested.


Tuesday Golf Ed Marlovits



1250 feet of elevation gain.



AREA 16 Fishing Report

For months, the Department of Fish and Wildlife has kept sports fishermen guessing whether there will be a salmon season in 2025 after two

years of closure.

This week, the Department finally ended the guessing game. We will have a salmon season in 2025. However, a better description is that we will be having salmon interludes. There will be four separate periods during which we can fish, the longest of which will be one week. The dates are June 7-8, July 5-6, July 31-August 3, and August 25-31. There is a seasonal limit of 7500 fish. Once the number is reached, the season will close, even if there are more dates left on the fishing calendar. No doubt that by the time that you read this, every spot on every party or charter fishing boat in northern California will have been filled by anxious salmon fishermen. We won't be left behind. We have booked four trips, with yours truly serving as fishmaster on two of them.

There are of course other fish in the sea (as well as the lakes and rivers). **Tom Kostik, Mike Corker, Brion Beetz, Phil Scimonelli, and Ken Bellinder** caught stripers in the delta, but not many keepers. However **Eric Finson, Cleo Bolen, and Jim Rowland** came up empty handed on their outing on the delta.

Bob Lively has continued to catch large trout fishing

from his kayak in Contra Loma Reservoir. **Carl Moyer, Zbig Mrozek, Dennis Lee, and Gordon Linebaugh** also caught some trout in Contra Loma Reservoir, but not many.

Pedro Contreras landed a large cutthroat trout fishing in Pyramid Lake, which is just north of Reno. Pedro also saw lots of fish swimming in the lake and so five of us will be traveling to Pyramid on June 6 to see if we can catch a few.

In March, we held our annual auction and many of us were able to purchase fishing equipment at bargain prices while helping the group replenish its treasury.

We have many trips planned in the coming months and so we hope that you can join us. Halibut fishing is just starting to heat up and we will be making frequent trips to the Bay to look for them. We also have trips planned for Lake Almanor, New Hogan Reservoir, New Melones Reservoir, Lake Berryessa, and our regular local outings in the ocean, delta, and nearby reservoirs. Our next two breakfast meetings are scheduled for April 24 and May 22 at the Legends Bar and Grill at Diablo Creek Golf Course, 4050 Port Chicago Highway in Concord. The meeting begins at 8:30am, but please join us for breakfast beginning at 7:30am for camaraderie and fish stories, even if you have never fished or have not fished in a long time, but are thinking about starting or renewing this activity.




Book Group Nick Jabuka

The Mighty Red by Louise Erdrich vividly describes life and growing up

in a small town in the rural, farming Red River valley of North Dakota. Environmental degradation caused by single-crop farming and the heavy use of pesticides serves as a backdrop for the novel's exploration of human and natural struggles. Teenage love, family relationships, race, and environmental issues are all explored as we get to know the novel's primary characters.

A hard-working mother, Crystal Frechette, worries about her daughter Kismet, who is romantically involved with Gary Geist, the heir to the town's most successful farm. Kismet is a bright student from a financially strained family. Popular but at the same time an outsider. Gary proposes to Kismet, who reluctantly agrees to marry him despite her secret relationship with Hugo, a classmate. Gary is also the town football hero, but he also carries a burden of guilt due to his actions that led to a tragic accident.



dent. Martin Frechette, Crystal's estranged husband and Kismet's father, makes life difficult for his wife and Kismet as he absconds with money from a local church and goes on the run as a bank robber in various disguises.

The primary characters of the book experience unhappiness, infidelities, a hidden accident, and living on the run, hardly the makings of a positive ending. Somehow, the author guides the characters through these difficulties and delivers a happy ending. You will have to read the book to find out how.

Recommendation

Our group agreed that the author was very adept at creating characters while telling a story about ordinary people doing, for the most part, ordinary things. While not for everyone, the book is a fun read with an interesting ending.

Next month's book is 'Say Nothing' by Patrick Radden Keefe. A story about a murder and abduction taking place in Northern Ireland during the 'Troubles' of the early 1970s.

Couples Duplicate Bridge 2 Dave Pierce


Good friends gathered and were warmly hosted by **Brad** and **Lynne Hatcher** on April 8th. Treats were in abundance. Slams were not.
