Chits will not always say beef and fish but will more accurately reflect the meat and fish menu. If the meat is not beef, the chit will not say that it is. 5. And, good news, **Gerry Blake** has committed to the same prices next year for both the luncheon and drinks. There is an old saying that says "the proof of the pudding is in the eating". We need to monitor this and make sure **Mr. Blake** follows through with his commitment next year.

I'd like to thank **Don Nunn** for his excellent work with the survey and also, the highly successful dinner dance. Also, thanks to **Ray Kan** for his valuable input. Finally, welcome to our new members, **Mike Cavallo**, **Frank Fries** and **Allen Johnson**.



SEA SALT

Unrefined sea salt, made by evaporating sea water, contains small amounts of magnesium, sulphur, and calcium. But it is never sold that way. By the time it is refined, cleaned and processed into a retail product, it is virtually identical to ordinary table salt, though much more expensive. While it is often sold in health food stores, there are no nutritional advantages of sea salt over regular salt. In fact, sea salt does not contain an essential mineral that is added to table salt—iodine.

ANTI-AGING VITAMINS

Vitamin C boosts the immune function, helps the body fight viruses, bacteria and allergens, and promotes re-growth and repair of body tissue. It helps prevent life-threatening ailments, including heart disease, diabetes, and cancer. So says **Jameson Starbuck**, ND, a naturopathic physician in family practice and a lecturer at the University of Montana, in Missoula

Dr. Starbuck calls vitamin C her “absolute favorite anti-aging medicine.” She recommends 1,500 mg per day: 500 with each meal. She says, however, do not take vitamin C if you have high levels of iron in your blood, as vitamin C increases iron absorption.

GENERIC DRUGS

About 40 percent of all prescriptions written are for generic drugs. But scientists say that they could be as high as 75 percent. Generic drugs are copies of brand name drugs. The active ingredients, as well as strengths and dosages are the same. The color and fillers may be different, but generic drugs are identical in all important aspects to the brand name ones. Generic drugs are 30 to 50 percent less expensive than brand name drugs. Talk to your doctor about generic versions of prescriptions drugs you are taking. There may be a reason why your doctor prefers to prescribe brand name versions. On the other hand, there may not be.

SERVING SIZES

Serving sizes are getting larger. There are three suggestions from the Center for Science in the Public Interest: Order a “small”... Share with a friend... Put half in a doggie bag before you start eating.

NEW CAR? THINK SILVER

If you’re planning to buy a new car, silver, it turns out, is the safest color. According to studies in New Zealand, occupants of silver colored cars had half the risk of serious injury from crashes compared to white, blue, red or yellow. Silver cars are the most visible; black and brown ones are the least visible.






