Green. Bill is the president of the Viet Nam Veterans of Diablo Valley and will present "The Experience and Legacy of the Viet Nam War." Our veterans are encouraged to wear the uniform of their service.

In October, we were pleased to honor **Chuck Bates** with a Super Senior SIR Award and **Bill Snyder** for his twenty years of membership and service to our branch. We received a rousing presentation from Cal Rugby Coach Jack Clark. We installed new member **Bob West** (sponsored by **Fred Kovar**) so let's be sure to help **Bob** become acquainted with our wonderful membership. We entertained five guests as well. November is the last meeting to have the branch pay for your guest(s) lunch, so take advantage and bring a guest or two or three to our luncheon meeting.

At our BEC meeting, after presentation from our subcommittee on the topic, our officers and board approved a recommendation to encourage annual payment of dues and luncheon costs. This would greatly reduce the administrative tasks associated with collecting money at each luncheon. For 2018, advance payment of \$208 would cover pre-payers for 10 lunches and their \$18 annual dues, thus effectively providing 2 free lunches and their membership fee. Ladies' Day luncheons are not included in the advance payment.

This brings us to the next topic. Our December Ladies' Holiday Luncheon is scheduled for Thursday, December 14th. We will be entertained by the Devil Mountain Chorus, a group of about 25 men singing acapella in barbershop style harmony. They are an excellent group, so get your reservations in early on the form provided on page 11 of this month's SIR CALL. Cost is \$28 per person, \$56 per couple. Lunch options are provided on the form.



As we are ending the calendar year, and welcoming another year of fun activities with Branch 146, we should be cognizant that we are a volunteer organization. We will be looking for those in our branch who are willing to step up and indicate their willingness to participate in the leadership of the branch in the various activities we have. 

If you wish to carpool, meet at the turnoff at St Stevens Rd off Hwy 24 at 9:30 am. Turn right and park on El Nino Rd where there is plenty of parking. I have room for three.




Malcom's wife sent home-made pumpkin cake, which meant a good time was had by all!




Couples Dining Out

Finding a restaurant for the November Couples Dining Out event turned out to be a more challenging task than most months primarily because of our search for a "special" restaurant for our end of year experience. We checked out Vic Stewart's again, but they have not been responsive. We since have learned, according to the Contra Costa Times, that Vic Stewart's has announced its restaurant is closing permanently at the end of this year!

So, we checked out several other places recommended by our diners, but none was really satisfactory for our discriminating group. Then, again based on a recommendation, we checked out an acclaimed small French restaurant in Lafayette. We made several visits, agreed on a menu, and price, and had agreed on two evenings for dining out experience. But, the chef and owner decided they really could not accommodate our size group even over two evenings, so we went back to the drawing board (but, we still recommend this new place –ask us!)



After visiting three new options, we decided to return to Massimo's restaurant in downtown Walnut Creek, where we had dined as a group several years ago. The owner, Max, is always accommodating and we were able to reserve Tuesday, November 14th, for an excellent dinner for \$52 per person. Massimo's has a wood paneled private room which will seat 50 diners and will be most appropriate for our end of year dining celebration.

We will have a Caesar Salad to start, then have three entrees to choose from – a Chicken piccata, grilled

Salmon, and a New York steak, with a house-made Tuscan apple tart for dessert. Max has agreed to extend the happy hour pricing of \$7 per glass of wine to our group – or you can bring your own for a \$20 corkage. Parking is, of course, easy with the parking garage across the street.

The restaurant has been one of the top restaurants in Walnut Creek for over 40 years – they must be doing something right! The ambiance is great, portions are generous, and the food with a northern Italian flair is always superb. What's not to like?

We can accommodate a maximum of 50 diners and we are fast approaching this number as of this writing – email me promptly to be placed on the list and confirm with your check – see you there!

The largest fish was a 27 pounder that was caught by **Gordon**. We even caught salmon when not fishing for them when **Harry Sherinian** landed a large salmon while fishing for stripers with **Tom Kostik** in the Delta.

Rich Fiscina, **Paul Dubow**, **Terry Miller**, and **Gordon Linebaugh** had an interesting day that started on the ocean. They set out through the Golden Gate for salmon but the water was rough so they stayed near the Gate and caught a bevy of rockfish. They then moved back into the Bay and tried there for salmon. With no luck, they switched to halibut and caught four. However, while fishing for halibut, **Terry** had a big strike and it turned out to be a five foot green sturgeon, which he landed and released.

Tom Anders, **Phil Scimonelli**, **Pedro Contreras**, **Rich Fiscina**, **Terry Miller**, and **Carl Moyer** also did well fishing for rockfish and ling cod in the ocean.

Inland, stripers fishing was good as **Tom Kostik**, **Mike Corker**, **Joe Miscione**, **Mario Moratorio**, and **Harry Sherinian** all came home with the tasty fish. **Phil Scimonelli** caught trout and bass in Lake Shasta. **Alex Go**, **Terry Miller**, and **Carl Moyer** caught catfish in San Pablo Reservoir. **Karl Droeze** and **Paul Dubow** journeyed to Pyramid Lake in Nevada and caught and released 50 cutthroat trout fishing from a boat. **Ernie Wong** also made the trip but he chose to fly fish from shore, where the fishing is not quite as good this time of year, but he still managed to land four or five fish.



San Francisco-Delta Bay Model Sausalito, California




The 4th Explore & Eat event for 2017 is at the San Francisco Bay-Delta Model in Sausalito. The Bay Model is a three-dimensional representation of San Francisco Bay and the Delta capable of simulation tides, currents and the river inflows. The Model is operated by the US Army Corps of Engineers and spreads over 1.5 acres and represents an area from the Pacific Ocean to Sacramento. The Model is housed in a beautiful building and is fully accessible. The address of the Model is 2100 Bridgeway, Sausalito, CA. Admission to the Model tour is free; as is ample parking next to the Visitors Center.

The model provides scientists, engineers, educators, students and visitors a unique opportunity to view the complete bay-delta system at a glance. We have made arrangements for a Army Corps Docent to lead the tour beginning a 10:00 am. The Model is currently not operational due to some needed repairs, however the Docent will be able to share with us the workings and history of the Model and how models like this can help with studying the effects of climate change, water quality, water demand by farmers and for the proposed "Twin Pipes" project for water users in Southern California. Following the tour there will be time to visit the "Marinship Exhibit". The exhibit is located in the Bay Model Visitors Center and is an historical monument to a remarkable shipyard located in Sausalito during World War II.



I wanted to let you know that we are exploring other methods to supplement the SIR CALL in displaying your monthly submitted pictures.


