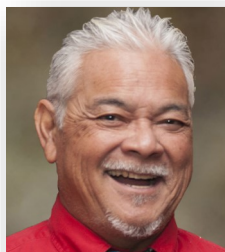
Big Sir then introduced each of the past Big Sirs who were in attendance at the luncheon.

Please continue inviting new members as we constantly lose members to relocation, or health issues.

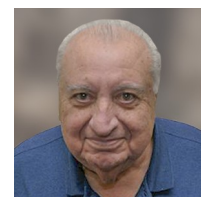

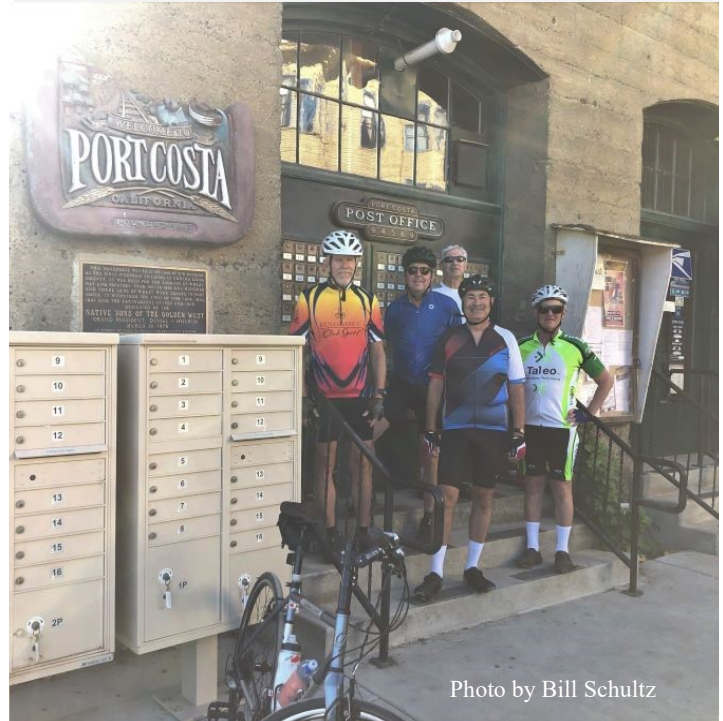

Our November Couples Dining Out event will be one for the books! As we indicated in the October newsletter, we thought we would go back to Wence's Restaurant in Pleasant Hill on November 18. We've been to this restaurant on at least two occasions, and the entrée selections are always good, as well as the soup and salad and desserts.

Also, the separate dining area can accommodate our large group. In reviewing the banquet menus, we decided to select one of the higher priced ones since we wanted to have a special dinner as we approach the holiday season. The total all-inclusive price would be \$60 and this menu is truly one of the fancier ones in recent memory. We publicized the restaurant only a day before announcing it at the October luncheon.

Amazingly, we had about 54 diners sign up in about a day, and at this point have closed the signups after we reached 71. I have visited the restaurant again and assured myself that they can seat this number with comfort. The menu will have lots of choices – starting with a choice of lobster soup or Caesar salad. For the entrees, there are five choices: a 12 oz Rib eye steak, a seared Chilean Sea Bass served with prawns, clams and mussels, a Lobster Seafood Fettuccine, and a 14 oz White Marble Pork Chop. For the vegetarian entrée, an "Earth's Garden" selection will be available. For dessert we will have a choice of tiramisu, or cheesecake. Coffee will be available.

We will start with our conventional social cocktail hour at 5:30pm. You will be able to take advantage of the \$5 house wines, or \$4 draft beer during the early Happy Hour. Remember that they have a cocktail menu, which includes higher priced wines and cocktails so take care in specifying your choice. Corkage is \$25.

Wence's is located in an unobtrusive strip mall at 1922 Oak Park Blvd. and parking is limited in the mall lot, but some street parking available as well. Coming early and car pooling will make parking easier with our larger than usual group. Rather than limiting this event to 50 as originally planned, we decided to accommodate this larger group and enjoy this end of our Dining Out season with as many as possible.

No plans yet for January, but we always meet the challenge – and will enjoy socializing and dining with all of you in 2020!

The Pioneers, by David McCullough

Following the revolutionary war, representatives from each of the thirteen original states met in Philadelphia to draft articles on how the new democratic government would work. At about this same time, men in the northeastern states began planning how to open the vast lands of the Ohio river basin for development.

McCullough's book begins by describing how this latter group managed to set up the Ohio Company for financing of the new territory and by drafting the articles (Northwest Ordinance, 1787) needed to join the new United States.

Through research based on personal diaries, letters, newspaper stories and other documents, McCullough reveals the trials and tribulations experienced by the pioneers who had the courage to venture into a world having few people, no roads, nor shelters. The book is an easy read, but the group felt it was not up to the standards of *The Wright Brothers*, which our group read last year.

For our next book we selected *The Guardians* by John Grisham. We will meet at the Greenery Restaurant on Monday, December 2, 2019 at 8:30am.

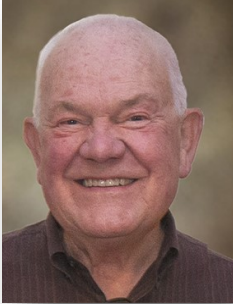

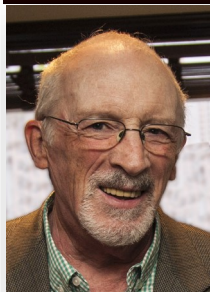

We will be hiking the Wildcat Peak trail in the Tilden Nature Area on Friday, November 15th, at 10:00 am. We will meet at Little Farm parking lot for staging. Wonderful views from the top of the peak to most of the bay, including all the bridges, SF skyline, Oakland shipping port, Mt. Tam, etc.

This hike is moderate with about 700 feet elevation change to the peak and is about 4 miles in length. This is a loop hike starting with the Packrat trail to Jewel Lake, then Sylvan trail to hook up with Wildcat Peak trail. After a break at the top of the climb to consume snacks and water, we will make our way down the hill with a brief stop at the Rotary Peace Grove. From there to Laurel Canyon trail, Pine Tree trail, back to Laurel Canyon trail, and finally to Little Farm. At Little Farm you can observe the domestic animals and/or take in a tour of the Environmental Education Center. This hike should take about 2 hours at a brisk pace or more like 3 with many breaks.

From Highway 24 west bound at Orinda, take Fish Ranch Rd to Grizzly Peak Blvd. and turn right. Continue on Grizzly Peak through the Berkeley hills until you reach the intersection of Spruce St., Wildcat Canyon Dr. and Canon Dr. Turn right onto Wildcat Canyon Rd, then immediately make a sharp left turn on Canon Dr. At the bottom, turn left on Central Park Dr. and follow road to Little Farm parking area.

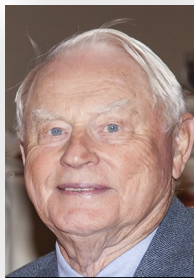
