

For our October Monthly Luncheon, we are pleased to have The Executive Director of the Save Mt. Diablo Foundation, Mr. Edward Sortwell Clement, Jr., as our speaker.

The Save Mt Diablo mission is to preserve Mount Diablo's peaks, surrounding foothills, and watersheds; and its sustaining Diablo Range, through land acquisition and preservation strategies designed to protect the mountain's natural beauty, biological diversity, and historic and agricultural heritage; enhance our area's quality of life; and provide educational and recreational opportunities consistent with protection of natural resources.

Ted Clement has been studying and working in the conservation field for almost 40 years. He was an environmental studies major at the University of Vermont, where he received his Bachelor of Science degree, and he later received his Juris Doctor degree from Vermont Law School where he focused on land conservation law. Early on, Ted worked for the Out-

ward Bound School and then for the Peace Corps national park program in Thailand. Then he worked for several years for the Vermont Land Trust, Aquidneck Land Trust in Rhode Island, and the Hawaiian Islands Land Trust. At the latter two served as Executive Director. He started work for Save Mount Diablo in November 2015. Ted is passionate about his family, time outdoors, and working with others to create lasting public good by protecting and connecting people to the land and communities that sustain us. Ted is a very experienced and dedicated land conservationist and for all of us at SIR146, many who hike, bike, run, visit, and enjoy Mt. Diablo, this will be a very interesting discussion.

In subsequent months we will have **John Elstead**, a member of SIR146, and a former Top Gun Pilot who has some incredible real-life stories, and then the Devil Mountain Chorus will return in December. The Speaker's Committee **Jim Pope, Glenn Breslin, Jim Crites** and myself will keep you updated. We appreciate any suggestions that you may have for interesting speakers.

Our next CPR Training Class will be on Friday, Oct. 24th and we only have two spots still open, so please let me know if you'd like to join. AREA 16 Fishing Report

We enjoyed our annual rockfish/lingcod jaunt on the *Sea Wolf* on August 22. The trip was different this year because we did not go to the Farallon Islands. That was so

because rockfishing in August was limited by the Department of Fish and Wildlife to depths above 300 feet and out in the Farallons, the fish are below 300 feet. Nevertheless, we journeyed almost as far because the fish were off Bolinas. It was a great day as all of us limited on rockfish and some of us on lingcod. I must confess that I had the best day as I hauled in a 25 lb. lingcod and won the pool. It turned out



that the fish was a hitchhiker, i.e., I had hooked a smaller lingcod and the big guy decided to eat him while he was on the hook and would not let go. But fish life is ironic. The predator wound up on the din-

ner table and his attempted victim was released to fight another day.

The second half of the ocean salmon season opened in September, but it only lasted four days as the limit imposed by the DFW was reached at that time. **Carl Moyer** was able to get out twice and caught his limit on both occasions. **Matt Richards** picked up a gigantic salmon that weighed over 30 lbs.

On the other hand, salmon can be caught on the rivers. **Karl Droeze, Gordon Linebaugh, Dennis Lee, Steve Smith** and I tried our luck on the Feather River near Oroville. I proved to be the best fisherman because I did not lose a single fish. But that was because I did not have any bites. Gordon did land one salmon and that was it for us. Perhaps we should have tried trout fishing. **Dave Rege** went fly fishing on the Sacramento River, near Redding and caught twelve rainbows over 12 inches. One of them reached 28 inches!

There was other activity in the ocean. **Matt Richards** had the most interesting experience, He worked on a research project with scientists from UC Davis and he was able to catch over 400 rockfish and lingcod over several days which were examined and released by the scientists. **Eric Finson** caught some small stripers and rockfish; **Shawn Kelly** landed halibut on his Boston Whaler; and **Carl Moyer, Dennis Lee, and Bob Lively** limited on rockfish on another trip. On the same trip **Bob** caught a nice halibut.

Tom Kostik made eight trips in the Delta, catching and releasing 314 fish, mostly black bass. **Mike Corker** and **Ken Bellendir** also did well fishing for black bass in the Delta.

Given that it is summer time, we also did a lot of out of state fishing. Several of us went to Alaska. **Dave Paulson** caught king salmon between 25 and 30 lbs. at several locations. **Karl Droeze** and five friends fished at Craig, Alaska, which is on Prince of Wales Island. Over three days, they caught a limit of 108 silver salmon, some halibut on lures, and many delicious black cod. **Dave Havlik** caught king salmon and halibut fishing at a lodge on the Southeast Peninsula, and **Brion Beetz** and **Tom Chapman** spent a week in Seward and caught over 250 lbs. of silvers.

Pete Gates, Lee Clark, and friends made a repeat visit to a lodge in Port Hardy, British Columbia where they hammered the silver salmon. But they only caught a single halibut because the weather precluded them from fishing in the ocean. **Sam Oommen, Gordon Linebaugh, Ken Bellendir**, and **Barry Latner** were able to have a more varied experience at the same lodge a few weeks later, catching limits of silvers, halibut, rockfish, and lingcod.

Ernie Wong caught cutthroat trout weighing between 10 and 12 lbs., fly fishing from a ladder at Pyramid Lake in Nevada. **Jim DiPippo** hauled in some sturgeon

In the Bay, **Ron Lew** and friends caught quite a few leopard sharks. **Phil Scimonelli** landed halibut fishing on the *Pacific Pearl* and had an adventure when the boat collided with a sailboat on the way back to the dock. Fortunately, there were no injuries. **Pedro Contreras, Ken Bellendir, and Tom Chapman** caught stripers and halibut fishing on Pedro's

boat while fishing on the Columbia River near Astoria, Oregon. The largest was eight feet long.

Down in Mexico, **Stan Wong** landed a five foot octopus and his companion **Brion Beetz** hooked a 40 lb. opah. **Brion, Stan, Pedro Contreras, and Steve Paulick** enjoyed their annual weeklong sojourn on the *Red Rooster II*, which is based in San Diego but fishes off the Baja California peninsula. They limited on yellowfin tuna between 30 and 75 lbs. nearly every day and also caught bluefin and yellowtail. However, the highlight of the trip was hooking three 100+ lb. marlin. None were landed because they did not want to keep the fish.

Our next breakfast meeting is scheduled for October 23 at the Legends Bar and Grill at Diablo Creek Golf Course, 4050 Port Chicago Highway in Concord. The meeting begins at 8:30 am, but please join us for breakfast beginning at 7:30 am for camaraderie and fish stories, even if you have never fished or have not fished in a long time but are thinking about starting or renewing this activity.


Book Reviews – August Meeting

We enjoyed an interesting meeting

this month, reviewing *The Have and Have Yachts* by Evan Osnos, sharing our scary or dangerous experiences as children or young men (some were truly frightening), and deciding on a new book for September. The review of our book led to a lively discussion on our country's current condition, disparity in wealth, corruption in our government, and where, as a country, we were headed or needed to go. Much like today's voting public, we didn't reach a consensus, but agreed to disagree.

The Book

The Have and Have-Yachts: A collection of essays (many initially for *The New Yorker*) that explore the lives, power, habits, and moral tensions of America's ultra-wealthy elite. The author delves into how extreme wealth is built, maintained, showcased, and shielded from political or social constraints.



Major themes of the essays include: Spectacles of wealth- superyachts, luxury bunkers, lavish parties and events; Inequality & Power – how elites influence politics, trusts, tax law, use tax and regulatory havens (countries) to preserve and expand their power; Escape/Insulation- thru the use of obfuscating legal structures, developing remote estates, bunkers, island retreats and massive yachts, the elites of attempt to protect themselves from societal scrutiny, norms and consequences.

There is also some commentary by the author on the potential dangers to democracy and society of this level of extreme wealth disparity.

Recommendation

The Have and Have-Yachts – the group didn't recommend this book due to the at times erratic writing style and the lack of a summary or conclusion.

Next month's book is *The Woman in Suite 11* by Ruth Ware, a psychological thriller. This book is a follow-up to her bestselling multi-million-copy novel *The Woman in Cabin 10*, which is coming soon to Netflix, starring Keira Knightley

The Lodi Energy Center (LEC) is located at 12751 North Thornton Road, Lodi.


